To all who gave personal resources and time to FFA in 2016, thank you. You are the lifeblood of the Tennessee FFA Foundation. Because of you, FFA members are able to have a quality experience in the organization that develops their potential for premier leadership, personal growth and career success through agricultural education. One such way your support is transforming the lives of agricultural youth is through FFA Camp Clements.

Camp Clements is celebrated as the nation's first FFA camp. It is also Tennessee's only FFA camp serving students from Munford to Mountain City. For generations, FFA has made the most of its one and only camp. In fact, in the summer of 2016, 89 high schools participated in the weeklong leadership training experience, which takes place in a bucolic setting on the banks of the Caney Fork River. FFA camp places students in classes focused on leadership and skill development with other agriculture students from across the state.

The camp is a partnership between the State of Tennessee and the Tennessee FFA Association. For more than 50 years, the State of Tennessee has leased FFA Camp Clements from the Tennessee FFA Association for the express purpose of extending educational opportunities to agricultural education students, as well as other career and technical education students. It may surprise you to learn that six other Tennessee Department of Education student organizations participated in conferences and camps at Camp Clements last year. That is in addition to the seven weeks of FFA camp and numerous other FFA events held on the grounds throughout the year.

The relationship between Camp Clements and the State of Tennessee is a mutually beneficial partnership that annually offers thousands of students the chance to learn lessons that will positively influence their lives for years to come. I can personally attest to that.

As we work to build on the legacy and success of Camp Clements, the FFA Foundation is working to raise funds to improve the grounds. With the last new structure at Camp Clements built in 1986 (a gymnasium), the camp is aging and has several deferred maintenance needs that cannot wait.

With your support, the support of our state and continued interest from students, FFA Camp Clements will remain a cornerstone of the FFA program in Tennessee. 

MEMBERS AND MENTORS

Support Inspires Next Generation to Greatness

In rural towns across Tennessee, there are a few people you will always find – loving parents, farmers, teachers and FFA members. They undoubtedly go hand in hand. In these towns, FFA members are taught to be leaders in their schools, communities and at home; however, we sometimes forget who is leading them. FFA members succeed for two reasons: a loving and dedicated support system and the self-motivation to make a difference.

Tennessee FFA is home to remarkable student members and mentors who normally go unnoticed but deserve recognition. Dylan Hunt is an outstanding FFA member from the McNairy Central FFA chapter. In his first year, Dylan reached the two highest peaks a greenhand FFA member can attain. Dylan won the Tennessee FFA State Creed Speaking Leadership Development Event. He went on to compete at the National FFA Convention, where he won a silver award. Also at the Tennessee FFA State Convention, Dylan was selected as the Tennessee FFA Star Greenhand, which is awarded to the most outstanding freshman FFA member who is enrolled in agriculture

education for the first time, has demonstrated superior leadership and has strong plans for a supervised agriculture experience (SAE) program. Farming is a way of life for Dylan, his parents, Brad and Jennifer, and his older brother. Dylan works on his family's 2,500 acre farm. The family farm consists of 200 head of commercial cattle, 410 acres of pasture and bermuda grass, and 2,000 acres of row crops. Dylan's SAE focuses on owning an operation similar to his family's. He owns a herd of

registered Charolais cattle, in addition to an operation consisting of 16 acres of corn and 65 acres of soybeans. Dylan has plans to leave the family farm for college, but to one day return to improve the operation. His inspiration comes from seeing his hardworking parents; his agriculture teacher, Rod Barnes; and a sixthgeneration farmer.

Tennessee Commissioner of Agriculture Jai Templeton is a sixth-generation farmer from the same rural community as Dylan. Their family farms operate side by side, and their houses are a mere mile apart. Before Commissioner Templeton made his move to the Tennessee Department of Agriculture, he was the Mayor of McNairy County. His heart was always full when helping young men and women in rural communities find their place in life. As the Deputy Commissioner of Agriculture and now the Commissioner of Agriculture, Jai has been and always will be a strong proponent of agricultural education and FFA, and an advocate for developing youth in farming communities. Rural roots and the heart of a farmer make Commissioner Templeton the ideal role model for a young man like Dylan Hunt.

"Commissioner Templeton does his best to promote and strengthen agriculture in our county and the state," said Dylan. "It shows everyone from our small community that if you are passionate about something, you can make it happen."

Commissioner Templeton's dream to make a difference in agriculture and rural communities, while never losing the passion for the family farm, inspires Dylan to do

the same. Dylan plans on attending the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, majoring in agricultural business. With a degree and a wealth of knowledge in tow, Dylan will one day return to the family farm and the small rural community he and Commissioner Templeton call home. Together, they will continue to make a difference in the lives of students and in their beloved community.

Just as Commissioner Templeton inspires
Dylan, there are mentors impacting FFA
members all across the state. Emily Ellison is
the President of the Cocke County FFA chapter
in East Tennessee. Her resume speaks for
itself, as she has been a high individual in dairy

evaluation and a two-time district employment skills winner, and is involved in numerous career and leadership development events. In addition to those events, she has competed and performed in national and state FFA talent. She is the President of the Tennessee Junior Sheep Producers Association, which contributes to her successful SAE. Emily's SAE is sheep entrepreneurship. She has approximately 70 head of registered polled dorset and shropshire sheep. She sells, shows and cares for her extensive sheep operation on her family farm. Outside of FFA and agriculture, her intelligence and leadership are just as impressive. She was recently named a Niswonger Scholar, which is awarded to the best and brightest leaders and community servants in northeast Tennessee. Emily has accomplished so much in a short period of time. Anyone can see the awards, accolades, ribbons and plagues; however, what you don't see is the guiding force behind her every step of the way.

Emily is unique in that she has a two-in-one mentor. Her father, Eric Ellison, is also her agricultural education teacher and FFA advisor. The relationship between father and daughter can be pretty special, but when you also add in teacher and advisor, there is little these two cannot achieve together. At every fair or FFA competition, Emily's father is there. He is there for the long nights in the barn and the early-morning FFA practices. He drives her to competitions, stands on stage when she accepts her awards and helps her decide which university is the best for her. Always beaming and ever proud, Eric Ellison does his best to be there for his daughter in more ways than one.

"As an advisor and parent, I was able to celebrate firsthand her successes in the FFA and support her, as I do with all my students, when things didn't go as planned," Ellison said. "From CDEs to livestock shows and conventions, I did not have to miss a moment of her FFA experience. Having her share the passion I have for FFA over the past four years has been life changing for the both of us. It has opened up doors for her that will positively impact her for a lifetime, and rekindled my enthusiasm as an agricultural education teacher and FFA advisor."

People often only see the success, not the hard work and commitment, from the student and those who help them along the way. Emily plans on majoring in animal science with a concentration in pre-veterinary science. She has not narrowed down which university she will call home for the next four years, but whichever school she does choose will be lucky to have her. Emily will always have a special place in her heart for FFA and the skills she learned during her time as a four-year member. She will one day return to Northeast Tennessee to train and mentor FFA members aspiring to become veterinarians, just as her father did for her.

Dylan Wood is an FFA member from the Cumberland County FFA chapter in Middle Tennessee, where he serves as the Vice President of Community Development.

Dylan was the state winner in the agriculture mechanics and fabrication proficiency last year for his work at Action Heating and Cooling in Crossville. He has installed and maintained all of the heating and cooling ductwork for the Avigen chicken houses as well as the University of Tennessee Extension Research Station in

Crossville. Dylan also does heating and cooling work for residential and commercial properties. Dylan is an impressive young man who has already obtained a skill and trade that can serve and provide him with a full-time job after he graduates from high school if he so chooses. Aside from being a hard worker and a dedicated FFA member, Dylan is also a servant leader. For the last two years, Dylan has coordinated a 5K race in memory of his brother. With the help of FFA, Dylan hosted the race this year and raised over \$7,000 for the Ronald McDonald House. Dylan recently coordinated a Passing Literacy Onward (PLOW) program at the elementary school across the street, in which Dylan met with the principal and set up multiple days to teach students about agriculture as well as the importance of reading and literacy. Dylan then coordinated a book drive at his high school FFA annual Christmas party. The books donated were given to kids at his local elementary school.

Dylan is a complete example of the type of person agricultural education and FFA strive to develop. Dylan has shown premier leadership in his FFA chapter, grown personally from serving his community and honoring his brother, and has advanced his career through working at Action Heating and Cooling. After joining FFA in junior high, he knew becoming an agriculture teacher was his calling. Dylan loves positively influencing young people and teaching them about agriculture. Dylan's FFA advisors are Terra Davis, Jason Atkinson and Danny Wilson. Each has contributed to Dylan's success in a special way and made an impact on his future goals.

"Dylan has been one of the best agriculture

students I have ever had," said Davis. "From the moment Dylan joined FFA and participated on the Opening and Closing Ceremonies Team, he has excelled and has been extremely active. Dylan is a great role model to the younger members and tries to make all members feel welcome to our FFA chapter. Dylan will be a great agriculture teacher and FFA advisor one day."

There is no doubt these three FFA members could have been successful on their own, but perhaps without the support of their mentors, they would not have known how high they could reach or the difference they could make. Philanthropic Endowment Creates Ongoing Scholarship



ohn E. Mayfield was a philanthropic man attempting to make a difference with youth. Prior to his passing in 2017 after a battle with cancer, he served on many nonprofit foundation boards, donated to several causes he believed in and strove to promote good decision making in the lives of young men and women. Mayfield went from not having any ties to the Tennessee FFA Foundation Inc. to becoming one of our larger individual donors because he believed in our mission.

In 2016, Mayfield donated \$10,000 to the Tennessee FFA Foundation Inc. to endow the John E. Mayfield Scholarship. At the 2016 Tennessee FFA State Convention, the first John E. Mayfield Scholarship was awarded to a deserving Tennessee FFA member, Will Gregory, from the East Robertson FFA chapter. With his endowment, the Tennessee FFA Foundation Inc. will be able to award a \$500 scholarship to an FFA member every year for the foreseeable future.

Mayfield not only valued educating rural youth, but believed in celebrating the history of such a storied organization. Mayfield generously sponsored the Tennessee FFA history book, titled "Tennessee FFA: Tradition and Transformation," at a \$5,000 level. With his support, the book was released in conjunction with the 100-year celebration of the Smith-Hughes act in the early part of 2017.



The 2017 ham breakfast was another a great success. Total proceeds from the ham sales, 65 table sponsors, three co-sponsors and nine title sponsors were\$46,850. The country ham sold to Farm Credit Mid-America for \$5,000. Tennessee Farm Bureau Federation purchased the packing house trim ham for \$4,500. The breakfast program included a gubernatorial candidate forum focusing on agriculture and education. Participating candidates included: Mae Beavers, Diane Black, Randy Boyd, Karl Dean, Craig Fitzhugh, Beth Harwell, and Bill Lee.

FFA BEEF BBQ GRILL MASTERS COMPETITION

In 2016, the Tennessee Beef Industry Council sponsored the inaugural FFA Beef BBQ Grill Masters Competition. The East Tennessee Regional Officer Team, Hendersonville FFA, Martin Westview FFA, McGavock FFA, Oakland FFA and South Gibson FFA all competed in the event. Teams grilled steaks and presented them to the judges; they were evaluated on taste, presentation and other grilling skills/techniques. McGavock took

first place, Oakland second and the East Tennessee Regional Officers finished in third.

The Tennessee Beef Industry Council sponsored the event again in 2017. The Hendersonville FFA, McGavock FFA, Mt. Juliet FFA, Riverdale FFA, Siegel FFA, Smyrna FFA and Martin Westview all competed. The structure of the contest remained the same as 2016 with the same judging and critique. Martin Westview took first place, Riverdale second and the McGavock chapter finished in third.

Bequest Ensures Painter Family Legacy Lives On

since its founding in 1928, FFA has worked to create a legacy of learning, leadership and growth through agricultural education. The aim of FFA is to develop student potential so FFA members are prepared to meet the needs of the agricultural industry, this country and this world. In doing so, FFA has created a legacy that has been passed down from generation to generation. Together, the alumni and membership of the organization form a family with bonds that will carry FFA forward.

Similarly, families involved in agriculture across Tennessee work to establish legacies that will survive generations and endure the changes that are sure to come. One such legacy is that of the Painter family. Fall Branch may not be a name recognized by most, but to the Painter family, it was home. Like many small towns across the Volunteer State, Fall Branch has seen its share of people, industries, schools and churches come and go. But one thing a small town never loses is its story.

The Painters are part of that story. Sarah (Painter) Stewart was raised on the family farm in Fall Branch along with her younger brother Wayne. Sarah and Wayne were the third generation of Painters who lived in the big, white farm house on Painter Road in Fall Branch, Tennessee, and farmed the land surrounding it. While she was an active member of the family farm crew, Sarah graduated high school before women were allowed to join FFA.

However, her brother received a high school

agricultural education and was a four-year (1960-64) member of the Fall Branch FFA Chapter. Wayne carried his love for agriculture into adulthood and carried on the family legacy on the farm in Fall Branch. When Wayne passed away last year, Sarah found herself many miles from home with a farm that was now her responsibility. With the difficult prospect of selling the family farm, almost serendipitously, things started to fall into place. A nearby farming family bought one portion of the farm, and a young, aspiring farmer bought the family home and the other adjoining portion of land.

Nonetheless, neither were Painters, and Sarah realized her family legacy must live on. That is when she and her husband, Pete Stewart, contacted the Tennessee FFA Foundation staff to begin discussions for a bequest that would establish a scholarship bearing the Painter name. After many conversations with foundation staff, a plan was put into action for the Painter legacy to live on. This scholarship was made possible by proceeds from the sale of the farm after Wayne's passing and is dedicated to the memory of the Painter family and their impact on their community. It is intended to help preserve and strengthen the tradition of the family farm. Now, the family will have a lasting mark on FFA by giving students the chance for higher education.

The Stewarts advise FFA members and other donors, "The most important key to happiness and success in life is not knowledge, intelligence or ability — it is our choices."

Two Tennessee FFA Foundation, Inc. Board Members Share Thoughts on FFA, Agriculture, and Joining the Century Club

s a young person, Kristina McKee had a definite passion for agriculture. Her rearing on a dairy farm in Watertown, Tennessee, where she was surrounded by community-driven farm families ensured that. McKee's high school experience did not involve FFA membership however, as delegates did not vote to allow women entry into the organization until 1969. Instead, McKee participated extensively in 4-H program activities to further her involvement in the agriculture industry. With the encouragement of committed adults and peers, McKee grew in her understanding of opportunities available to youth and professionals in agriculture, and focused on a career in livestock marketing.

As an adult, McKee's first interaction with Tennessee FFA members was at the 2014 Tennessee State Convention. There, McKee engaged by serving on the nominating committee for the 2015 Tennessee FFA Officer team and talking with members at general sessions. She was consistently impressed with the enthusiasm, professionalism, and respect

shown by members, indicating to her that the future of agriculture was in the FFA.

More than 200 miles away from Watertown, Joe Huffine's interest in agriculture developed while a member of the David Crockett FFA Chapter. As a young agriculture education student, Huffine learned from the same teacher who taught his father's agriculture classes. During his sophomore year of high school, Huffine's respected teacher retired, and an energetic advisor, David Boreing, entered the

classroom. With Boreing's commitment to Huffine's personal development and success in FFA, Huffine became motivated to compete. During active membership, Huffine competed in the Parliamentary Procedure Leadership Development Event and won the National Extemporaneous Speaking Leadership Development Event. As a collegian, Huffine continued to develop his perspective of the agriculture industry by participating in a European exchange program, "Network," resulting in a 12-week homestay on a wheat farm and vineyard in Austria, and a deeper understanding of the global importance of agriculture.

Today, both McKee and Huffine support the future of youth development in agriculture through personal financial contributions to the Tennessee FFA Foundation, Inc., as well as a significant time commitment to the organization by serving on the Tennessee FFA Foundation, Inc. Board of Directors. Huffine

describes his decision to serve on the board of directors as, "The opportunity to give back to this organization, aid in raising funds for these students, decide the best use of those funds, and advocate for FFA and agricultural education." McKee describes her participation on the board of directors as a "natural fit, continuing years of volunteer time giving back to agriculture."

This underlying theme of service, of giving back to a personally formative organization, of contributing to a foundational organization in the development of young agriculturists, not only drives Huffine and McKee to give of their time through the Tennessee FFA Foundation, Inc. Board of Directors, but through individual giving. Huffine, a parent, knows the financial burden of supporting student experiences and emphasizes, "anything we can do to lower or eliminate financial barriers so that every student can participate is important. Expenses only increase." As an agriculture professional, McKee indicated a way to ensure a vibrant

and dynamic future for agriculture involves encouraging the passion of members beginning to see opportunity in the agriculture industry.

The Tennessee FFA Foundation, Inc. recognizes donors who have given at least one hundred dollars per year over the course of ten years, by inducting them into the Century Club. As a part of this honor, inductees are named onstage at the Tennessee FFA State Convention, receive personalized blue corduroy banners to display in their home or workplace, and are listed in the annual report. To McKee, she is "honored to become a part of the Century Club, knowing that my contributions will help secure the future of this great organization and its youngest 'blue jacket' members." Huffine considers the Century Club a mile marker, or measurement, to let donors reflect on their history of giving and commitment to continue in support.

Both McKee and Huffine highlight the importance of local support and recognize that support does not only come in the form of finances. Huffine described some of FFA's greatest supporters as those who contribute in ways that are not financial: "Legislators may vote in support; school principals may allow teachers to use buses for convention transportation. Many people give in different ways: time, positive words, coaching, or finances." At the chapter level, Huffine regularly contributes through coaching. In partnership with Ryan Arnett, David Crockett FFA Advisor and Agriculture Educator, Huffine works with groups of young FFA members competing in Leadership Development Events like Creed Speaking, Extemporaneous Public Speaking,

and Prepared Public Speaking. As Huffine now lives in LaVergne, Tennessee, consistent, in-person training with competitors or officer candidates is not always feasible. However, with the help of FaceTime and Skype, Huffine's contribution to coaching sessions carries on. Additionally, Huffine's role at Tennessee Farmers Cooperative, a loyal Tennessee FFA sponsor, provides opportunities for Huffine to interact with and employ Tennessee FFA Alumni across the state.

McKee contributes to the local chapter by supporting member travel to Camp Clements or State FFA Convention and by participating in many chapter events. McKee enjoys opportunities to engage with members through their greenhouse projects, bar-b-q sales, and spaghetti dinners, providing time to chat with outstanding members and support their experiences.

Board members, McKee and Huffine. though from different areas of Tennessee, with different agricultural backgrounds, and involved in different segments of the agriculture industry, align in their support of Tennessee FFA members. As Huffine stresses, "Agriculture has a continual need for a talent pool. And, FFA members make better employees. They're engaged, confident, handle themselves well, and have a better appreciation of the agriculture industry than others." The Tennessee FFA Foundation congratulates McKee and Huffine on their induction to the Tennessee FFA Century Club, is thankful for their contributions to the board of directors, and, most importantly, to the growth of the future of agriculture.

Tennessee roots, leading to a lifestyle of service and contribution to agriculture and Tennessee FFA. John is an 8th generation Tennessee farmer with three siblings. As a young person, his FFA involvement began with seeing success at the state level from his sisters; Cindy, the first Tennessee State Sweetheart and Rhedona, State FFA Treasurer. John's journey into active membership began his freshman year by being a member on the Cookeville FFA state winning dairy judging team. His involvement grew through high

school and he was selected to serve as a Tennessee FFA State Officer in 1983.

Chelsea's FFA journey similarly began with success during her freshman year of high school at Eagleville High School. After she was encouraged to enroll in agriculture classes by her agriculture teacher, Bruce Haley, and her guidance counselor, she immediately became involved. She, like John, was a

member of a state winning team for Eagleville FFA that year, in the opening and closing ceremonies event. Her early experience of the opportunities available in FFA drove her to run for and serve as both a Tennessee FFA and National FFA Officer.

As John and Chelsea both transitioned from active membership in the local chapter to engaging at the collegiate level, their passion for Tennessee agriculture did not wane. FFA involvement offered each of them the opportunity to expand their global horizons by traveling to Japan; John, as part of an FFA exchange program, and Chelsea, as a National FFA Officer. With such robust backgrounds in the FFA, and degrees from Tennessee Tech University in agricultural fields, continuing to support the future of Tennessee agriculture is natural.

At the 2018 State FFA Convention, John and Chelsea Rose were named Eagle Society members for their level of giving reached in 2017. This recognition is reserved for companies and individuals that have given \$500,000-\$999,999 to the Tennessee FFA Foundation. Kelsey Rose, Executive Director of the Tennessee FFA Foundation highlights the importance of recognizing all donors, by honoring their gifts. Kelsey explained that without recognizing the donors from across Tennessee and the entire agriculture industry, many could fly under the radar. Whether recognition is given through the Annual Report, at State Convention, or through a member thank you note, donors from the Century Club to Eagle Society are important and appreciated.

Though John and Chelsea were recognized for their financial contributions, the pair is involved with FFA as donors, volunteers, and advocates. John volunteered as coordinator of the State Officer Nominating Process for the past 15 years, and has served as both the

Chairman of the Tennessee FFA Board of
Directors and the President of the Tennessee
FFA Alumni Association. Chelsea volunteers
as the coordinator of the National Officer
Candidate Screening, and previously worked
at the Tennessee FFA Foundation, working to
secure significant grants for Camp Clements
and creating new staff positions to serve
and support our members and agriculture
educators. Together, they have coached and
mentored numerous FFA competitors and
National Officer Candidates. Additionally, they
communicate regularly with elected officials
and government administrators to ensure

the FFA program in Tennessee receives the support it deserves.

In addition to dedicating time to FFA, John has represented agriculture in Tennessee as the Tennessee Commissioner of Agriculture and has chaired the Tennessee State Fair Association since 2010. In November 2018, John was elected to represent the 6th District of Tennessee as a U.S. Congressman in Washington, D.C. Even with these responsibilities, John and Chelsea enjoy when they are able to attend the Cookeville and Eagleville FFA banquets. Each is a lifetime

alumni member of their respective chapters. The couple credits their continued involvement to the belief that they, and everyone who benefitted from FFA, should strive to fill the shoes of the people who afforded them the opportunities they enjoyed as FFA members. It is important to John and Chelsea that, since they care for FFA so deeply, they are responsive to the needs of the organization through time and resources. Kelsey Rose, Executive Director of the Tennessee FFA Foundation, described her newfound level of respect for donors that give consistently, "Donors, such as John and Chelsea, can literally help build the framework for our future through their contributions. Over time, we are able to see possibilities beyond the day to day operations of our Foundation because of our consistent donors, especially those at such a high level of giving." This concept of frame-building and ensuring the Tennessee FFA Foundation mission of promoting "the best interest of students and those involved in agricultural education/ FFA in Tennessee in order to enhance opportunities that will enable every FFA member to reach their maximum potential as productive citizens" is a foundational direction for John and Chelsea's support. "Together," John describes, "Our generation of FFA alums and supporters can ensure FFA delivers opportunity to every Tennessee high school agricultural student. That's what matters."

Chelsea described her vision of Tennessee FFA being the best, nationally. "We believe in supporting our state staff and building that team up. We want every agriculture student

to experience the complete three-component model for agricultural education and become FFA members through 100% membership.

Teachers, every teacher, should have twelvemonth contracts that compensate them for their time spent on the job year-round. Lastly, we believe Camp Clements should continue to be a haven for FFA member development for another 90 years. All of these are achievable and all are important." Beyond his hope that Tennessee FFA continues to be better, John's sincere hope for Tennessee FFA is that young people will be inspired realize their potential and that teachers have the resources they need.

Various definitions cite philanthropists as those who love humanity, care for the needs of others instead of their own, and promote the welfare of others. Philanthropists exemplify the FFA motto, which ends with the phrase, "Living to Serve." Kelsey describes John and Chelsea as "true philanthropists" who are invaluable to Tennessee FFA. Chelsea expressed that FFA changed her life affording her opportunities in college, contributing to key relationships in her life, and impacting her professionally. She notes, "This organization changes young lives every single day. It is incredible. And, that positive change occurs while also giving students job-ready skills. How many organizations can say that?" Baker!" exclaimed the National
FFA Nominating Committee Chair. At the final
session of the 88th National FFA Convention
and Expo, Nick Baker of the Baxter FFA Chapter
at Upperman High School became the third

consecutive National Officer elected from Tennessee, slated as the National Secretary, just as his brother had been two years prior.

Six FFA members are chosen from chapters throughout the United States, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands to serve and represent the national FFA membership, which is comprised of 649,355 student members who belong to one of 7,859 local FFA chapters. Each officer travels more than 100,000 national and international miles to attend state conventions, do chapter visits, tour agricultural businesses and grow National FFA support.

One of Nick's high points of such an incredible year was the time he spent at Oklahoma's FFA camp. For three days, he was the leader of a small group comprised of 12 outstanding young people.

"What makes those few days stand out above

others was how much time they spent pouring into and supporting one another," Baker said.

"Whether it was encouraging each other on the ropes course, challenging one another to think differently in the development sessions or simply volunteering to help the camp staff clean up, they continually provided evidence that our organization is fostering a breed of young people who hold themselves to a standard of pure excellence."

Nick and his team selected "Transform" as the theme for their year. He saw transformation happen within the state officers from all over the United States. In particular, this summer at the State Presidents Conference, two state officers from each state convened in Washington, D.C., to propose policies that would be discussed at the national convention.

"What was so impressive was that the conversation never veered away from the question, 'What's best for the FFA members?'" explained Baker. "The state officers expressed just how deeply they wish to serve their state associations and enact change that would create the best opportunities available for the good of all FFA members."

Baker said he hopes these FFA members continue to transform FFA and their communities to make a positive impact.

When asked what it meant to represent
Tennessee on the national stage, Baker said,
"I'll never be able to express just how grateful I am to be a part of the Tennessee FFA family.
There are advisors all across this state that have spent years pouring into me and making me a better person, and for that, I am indescribably appreciative."

Nick's advisor was Steve York, and he received support from countless advisors, supporters and friends throughout his time in FFA. His parents are Phillip and Chris Baker of Baxter, Tennessee. "After a year of seeing this organization from top to bottom, I can say with confidence that our teachers, advisors and members are the best in the country," said Baker. "There's no place I'd rather call home than Tennessee."

In January, Nick is headed back to Rocky
Top to continue his degree in agricultural
communications at the University of Tennessee.
He plans on becoming active in student
government and his fraternity, Alpha Gamma
Rho, and attending as many UT football games
as possible. He hopes to graduate in 2019 and
aspires to enlist in the armed forces and later
pursue a master's degree with the ultimate goal
of working in public relations.

Ramsey Retires as Lt. Governor but Continues Commitment to FFA

t matters who governs." What began as a political tagline became a statewide mantra for Tennessee's elected and electorate alike.

Ron Ramsey is known for his profound statements, bold leadership and big ideas. His near-patented phrase embodied his ideology as Tennessee's Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the Senate and State Senator for the fourth district (R-Blountville). With retirement from his elected post, his service in state government will be remembered not for his big ideas, but for his big action.

That penchant for action has served FFA well

as the Lieutenant Governor has been an active member of the Tennessee FFA Foundation Sponsoring Committee since June 2014.

Invited by Lacy Upchurch (then Farm Bureau President) and appointed by Foundation Chair Ben Byler, Ramsey has been the leading force behind FFA's three new staff positions: East, Middle and West Tennessee FFA Consultants.

However, long before Ramsey was called on to serve as a member of the Sponsoring Committee he actively advocated for agricultural education in Tennessee. Under the leadership of the late Governor Ned R. McWherter the FFA Foundation Sponsoring Committee requested that Governor Phil Bredeson include \$500,000 for FFA and \$500,000 for 4-H in the State Budget. Thanks to the work of both Governors, the funds were appropriated and approved by the Tennessee General Assembly in 2006.

When the economy began to slow in 2007, the funds for FFA and 4-H were cut from the proposed State Budget. However, two East Tennessee lawmakers stepped in to make a difference: State Senator Ron Ramsey and State Representative Jason Mumpower. Due to their action and the support of numerous other lawmakers, much of the funds were saved within the Department of Agriculture budget as part of the Ag Enhancement Funds. They have stayed there since with support from four Commissioners of Agriculture and two Governors.

Amazingly enough, despite Ramsey's action for positive change in FFA, he was not an FFA member himself. The program was not offered at his high school as a teen. However, Ramsey was raised on the family dairy farm in Sullivan County and has never forgotten his agricultural roots.

During a visit with Foundation staff on his farm in Blountville, Ramsey shared some advice for those FFA members who may be interested in holding public office: "Really get involved in FFA and understand what that blue jacket means. Move your way into leadership and don't shy away from pursuing leadership roles on the national level; Tennessee has a great streak of National Officers to be continued."

As he fed his herd of beef cattle atop one of the many rolling hills on his East Tennessee farm, Ramsey looked out with a smile. The pride he takes in his home state, the land and the blessings he has to enjoy emanates from his steely, blue eyes. With hands on his hips after a long morning of farm chores that he only hopes to repeat on a daily basis he said, "Agriculture feeds our country and we need to make sure we have more young people ready to meet the needs of a population that struggles to understand where their food comes from and how it is produced," said Ramsey. "FFA is more than that, though. The leadership skills it teaches—I can't think of a better organization to prepare young people for life than FFA."

Ramsey has continued his service as a member of the Foundation Sponsoring Committee beyond his retirement from the Senate. No doubt, this man of action will continue to push FFA and its members to new heights for the betterment of Tennessee for years to come.
